25-inch First Edition Maps of
Melbourne
in the County of Derbyshire

This CD contains maps of Melbourne and the surrounding villages. The maps were produced in 1882, and are part of the 25-inch first edition maps of in Derbyshire. These maps are from an original set formerly among the documents belonging to Melbourne Parish Church and now in the collection of the Melbourne Historical Research Group. The maps were drawn to a scale of 1 to 2500 or 25.344 inches to the mile.

The CD is accessed via Adobe Acrobat reader which runs from the CD without installing anything on your computer. You can navigate from one map to an adjacent map. You can print any map or any magnified selection of a map. The area covered by these maps includes :- Ingleby, Stanton by Bridge, Weston upon Trent, Kings Mills, Melbourne, Kings Newton, Ticknall, Wilson and Calke

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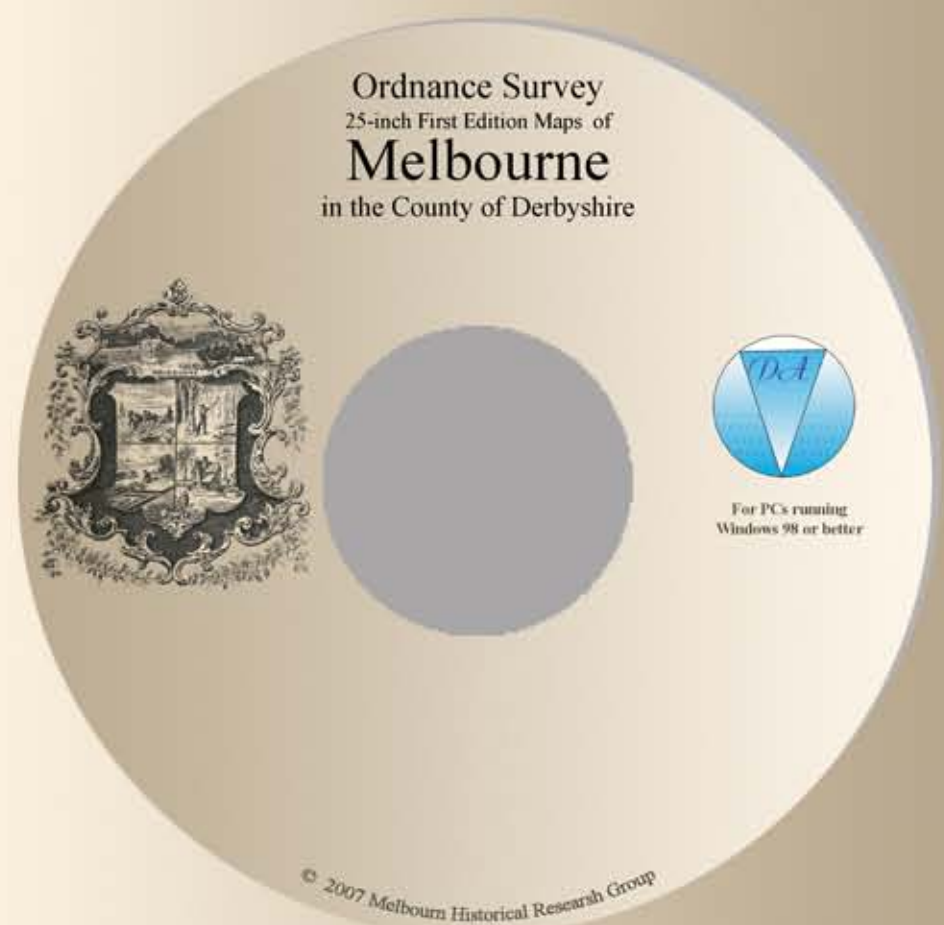
O.S. 25-inch First Edition Maps of Melbourne 1882



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This CD requires Adobe Reader installed on your computer, version 6 for Win98 or version 7 for WinXP. The installation files are included on the CD. To install Adobe Reader select, on the disc, the folder "Acrobat 6" if you are running Win98, or "Acrobat 7" if you are running WinXP, and double click on the file in that folder. Follow the instructions on screen.

To run the programme put the disc in the CD drive and it should autorun. You will be presented with a window that gives you three options. You can select to view the **Introduction** which will explain something of the background to the production of these maps. You can select the **Instructions** which will give you some brief instructions that will help you to get started with this CD. Finally you can select the main part of the CD, the **Maps**



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Cover Illustrations The bookplate reproduced on the front cover was originally printed for William Garratt, estate agent at Melbourne Hall, and probably dates from the 1890s. It depicts ploughing, forestry, draining and building on the estate and includes a cottage built by the estate on Trent Lane in 1889.
